- ◆ The Living Room Lecture series brought archaeologists, experts, and authors in various fields right into your home. Last year, the Center hosted 13 lectures on topics ranging from the archaeology of Torrey Pines to ancient Maya cave rituals with 1,558 attendees in total. Thank you to everyone who supported us by attending these lectures.
- Volunteers/interns returning to the lab: After having the Center lab closed for over a year, volunteers and interns are back in action. The Lab has 19 interns and volunteers for the summer. <u>Applications</u> are open now for the fall.
- Donations: Thank you to members and donors who have supported the Center with your gifts during our closure. A special thank you to Capt. and Mrs. Jim and Monica Bryant for their especially generous donations to the Center and to Jim Royle for his enormous support.
- Virtual exhibits: We created three new online exhibits, <u>Visions: Rock Art</u>

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Kids Dig: Breaking News in Archaeology

Welcome to Kids Dig, where our youngest community members can discover the latest news in archaeology.

Pack your bags for Italy! For the first time in its history, the underground areas of the Roman Colosseum are open for the public to explore! This series of tunnels and chambers, called the hypogeum, worked like a backstage for the events taking place in the arena above. Gladiator fights and other events were held here and many times raised up to the arena floor through a series of lifts and trap doors. This allowed the actors, wild animals, and gladiators to suddenly appear. Talk about some ancient special effects!



Emperor Vespasian built the Colosseum in 72-80 CE, the world's largest amphitheater. His son Titus would hold the first games and the last was held in in 523 CE. This grand arena could hold between 50,000 and 70,000 spectators, watching and cheering on the bloody and brutal games. Fights between gladiators, animals, and convicted criminals as well as battle reenactments were popular during this time.

You may never want to see these gruesome games back in the day, but it sure would be interesting to walk the halls of the gladiators now!




The underground hypogeum exposed

New Acquisitions

This past winter, the SDAC launched the new virtual exhibition *New Acquisitions!*

New Acquisitions is a virtual exhibit where we share information about collections coming into the Center. The exhibit is featured on the SDAC website and is being updated as new collections are acquired.

Most of the collections that are curated at the SDAC come to us from Cultural Resource Management (CRM) firms. These CRM firms work with developers from around the county to make sure that construction is done using ethical methods and that archaeological sites are protected and documented. Once their work is complete, CRM firms curate collections at the SDAC for long-term preservation and care, allowing for community research and access. Let's see what's new!

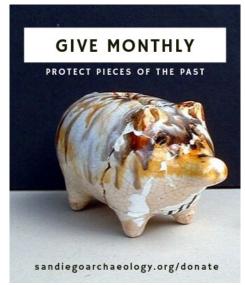

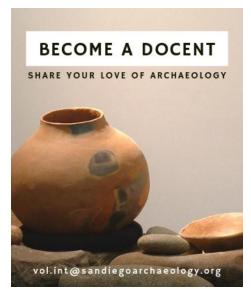
